Approach conflict as an opportunity to find a mutually beneficial solution. Listen to the other person's perspective and explore compromise.

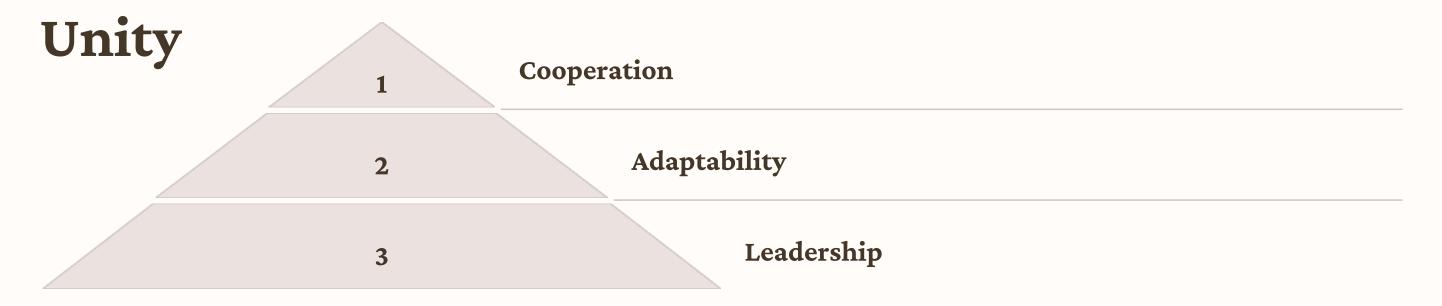
Compromise
